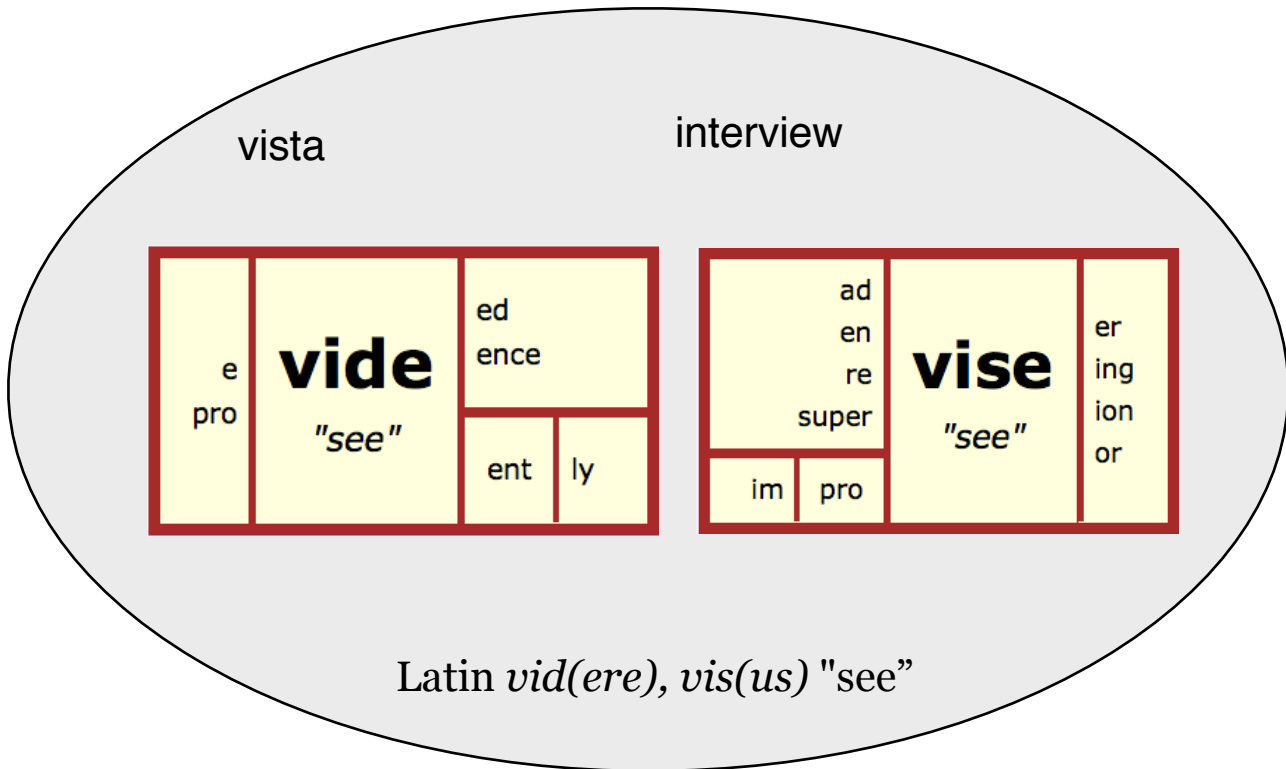

The etymological family of the Latin *vid(ere)*, *vis(us)* for “see”: The bolded words above, and those listed below all come from this same etymological family.
